## On the Bologna 'Key Commitments':

- These are basic **structural elements** of the Bologna Process and today of the EHEA:
- they made possible communication and connection among our very different preexisting HE systems
- they made possible student mobility and the development of international curricula within Europe and, as a term of reference, also beyond
- implementing them required **radical change** in nearly all countries







That approach, some of its features and its current developments are certainly of interest while building and consolidating the Central Asian Higher Education Area, the CAHEA.

Already a number of such reforms have been implemented or agreed in your countries, and provide a shared common ground for the future.

Of course, as we will hear later today, the structural aspects of the EHEA are by no means the only significant ones.







Here though I will speak first as Co-chair of the BFUG's Coordination Group on Global Policy Dialogue, then as a longtime friend and supporter of HE cooperation among Central Asian countries – ministries, universities, and 'learners'.







#### **Global Policy Dialogue:**

In the EHEA, there has been a recent important **shift**, not only in terminology.

From 2009 to 2018 a 'Bologna Policy Forum' was organised in conjunction with each EHEA Ministerial Conference. At the Paris Ministerial Conference, 2018, the EHEA Ministers asked the Bologna Follow Up Group (the BFUG), to organise a "Global Policy Forum" in conjunction with the future Ministerial Conference, and also to develop more constant and fruitful ongoing dialogue with other world higher education regions.







### **Global Policy Dialogue:**

The **shift** recognizes that:

- many world regions and macro-regions are engaged in building their own higher education areas:
- the pandemic has shown us how fast our world context can change
- dialogue and communication are even more necessary today than in the past.

Higher education has a strategic role to address global challenges and goals, not least the United Nations SDGs.







Because of the pandemic the first opportunity to organise a **Global Policy Forum** will be in **Tirana, in 2024**. Of course we hope to be able to **welcome the CAHEA** as one of the most significant participants.







Central Asian HE authorities, Rectors and academic staff have long looked at 'Bologna' with interest. We started to discuss this together in April 2004, eighteen years ago. There have been numerous common initiatives – including the large-scale **TuCAHEA** project ("Tuning the Central Asian Higher Education Area") in which many of you participated. These made relevant contributions to building innovative curricula, experimenting with regional student mobility and reaching preliminary cooperation agreements at Viceministerial level in 2015 and 2016.







Today the **CAHEA** has strong bases for participating in the Global Policy Dialogue:

The **CAHEA** also provides an **important model for other regions**:

- it **interlocks** with the EHEA, since Kazakhstan is a member of both;
- it is **well positioned** to express and promote the **specificity of the culture, the values and higher education systems** of its countries while implementing structures that facilitate communication with other HE regions.







#### One final note:

The BFUG now has something new: a «Task Force on «Enhancing Knowledge Sharing in the EHEA Community».

Its purpose is to develop **greater knowledge** of the EHEA and the Bologna Process among such key actors as university staff, administrators, professors and students – and also to ensure that their **ideas and suggestions** reach the BFUG, and the EHEA Ministers.







For the CAHEA, such a Forum as yours, of Rectors of Central Asian countries, where ministers, rectors and other experts meet to discuss and make agreements surely has an important role in carrying out this important function.

I congratulate you on the varied, concrete and future oriented presentations in your programme, and I look forward to seeing the future developments.
